1. General Rules

1.1 Organisation, Number of Competitions, Awarding of Competitions

- 1.1.1 The FIS Overall Cross-Country World Cup consists of individual competitions on distances longer than 1.8 km (Distance World Cup) and on Sprints shorter than 1.8 km (Sprint World Cup).

Furthermore, a number of relays and Team Sprints are organised which are included in the Nations Cup.

Future Calendar Frame; World Cup selection

World Cup Multistage Events

- 10-days event (Tour de Ski) with 8 competitions (6 Distance Races/2 Sprint Races)
- 5-days event (World Cup Final) with 4 competitions (3 Distance Races/1 Sprint Race).

- 1.1.2 **The FIS Cross-Country World Cup calendars** are planned by the FIS Sub-Committee for World and Continental Cups Cross-Country in a close collaboration with the National Ski Associations five years in advance. The FIS Sub-Committee for World and Continental Cups, however, has the right to make any changes in venue in order to guarantee the quality of the event.

Last minutes decisions

Depending on the case, an expert named by a joint agreement between the FIS Head Office (Race Director) and the Chairman and another member of the FIS Sub-Committee for World and Continental Cups Cross-Country will be called to make a decision together with the Organising Committee and the representative of the National Ski Association involved.

1.1.3 For all FIS World Cup events, a substitute resort has to be appointed in advance and named in the invitation.

If for any reason a FIS World Cup competition cannot take place, the FIS Race Director Cross-Country must be informed immediately. The substitute resort has to be confirmed in writing **until 18th September 2009**.

In the events where is insufficient or no snow in the courses selected for the competition(s), the Organising Committee must cancel the event(s) and this must be done **9 (nine) days** before the race (exceptional 6 days before, approved by the members of the last minutes decision, 1.1.2).

Depending on the case, an expert named by a joint agreement between the FIS Head Office and the FIS Sub-Committee for World- and Continental Cups Cross-Country will be called to make a decision together with the Organising Committee and the representative of the National Ski Association involved.

As a principle, a transferred competition shall be carried out in the same country. If that is not possible, the competition can be carried out in another country or postponed to a later date in the season.

2. Distances and Techniques

In principle, the competitions will be carried out with 50 % free technique and 50 % classical technique.

3. Number of Participants

3.1 Limitation

3.1.1 FIS World Cup 2009-2010

The quota is basically according to the Distance and Sprint World Cup. Calculation of the Quota:

Check and notice the quota for the "Multistage World Cup Events 2009-2010" (see enclosure).

3.1.2 **Additional Quotas**

Nations with more than 6 members on the Red Group (pay list) list, have the right to have additional quota. Seven members in the Red Group equals one additional quota, greater than seven members in the Red Group equals maximum two additional quota (maximum 8 athletes). The additional quota names must be from the Red Group.

The leaders (male and female) of all COC Cups after each World Cup period have the right to start in World Cup during the next World Cup period. The athletes have to reach the World Cup entry requirements. Those competitors must have a FIS code and have reached at least one (1) result better than or equal to 60 FIS points (Men Distance), 90 FIS points (Ladies Distance) and 120.00 FIS points (Ladies and Men Sprint). The Overall Winners from the previous season's COC have the right to start in the 1st World Cup period in the following season (beginning 2009-2010 season).

According to the Continental Cup rules, up to three Ladies and Men have the right to start outside of the quota in March 2008. The athletes have to reach the World Cup entry requirements. All requirements are fixed in the new Continental Cup rules 2009-2010.

The winners and the current leaders of these Continental Cups will get reimbursement according to art. 8.1.

For the Distance World Cup 2009-2010 the quota is valid under the condition that every individual competitor (= Ladies and Men) has a FIS code number and has reached at least one (1) result better than or equalizing:

- **60.00 FIS Distance points Men:** **for individual competitions**
- **90.00 FIS Distance points Ladies:** **for individual competitions**

during the last 365 days.

3.1.3 The previous season's **FIS "Overall" World Cup winners** and the previous season's FIS "Distance" World Cup Winners may start addition to a nation's calculated "Distance" quota and the FIS "Sprint" World Cup Winners may start addition to a nation's calculated "Sprint" quota.

3.1.4 **The number of participants of the organising country**, called national quota, may not exceed ten (10) competitors. Those competitors must have a FIS code number and have reached at least one (1) result better than or equalizing **120.00 FIS points**. For the pursuit competition, the national quota will be five (5).

3.1.5 **Nations, which have a Distance or Sprint quota of 3**, have the right to start with 4, if next day will be a Relay or a Team Sprint. But they do not have the right to get any further wax cabins for free.

3.1.6 For the season 2009-2010 the **Sprint World Cup quota** is valid under the condition that every individual competitor (= Ladies and Men) has a FIS code number and has reached at least one (1) result better than or equalizing:

- **120.00 FIS points (Sprint or Distance).**

3.2 Quotas / Number of Nations

Each FIS affiliated National Ski Association not carrying out a FIS World Cup can register one (1) competitor for the FIS World Cup competitions under the following conditions:

Distance competitions Interval Start / Mass Start / Pursuit

Minimum requirement: A maximum of **120 FIS Points** in a Distance competition of the valid FIS points list.

Sprint competitions

Minimum requirement: A maximum of **120 FIS Points** in a Sprint or Distance competition of the valid FIS points list.

3.3 Red Group

3.3.1 FIS Distance and Sprint World Cup 2009-2010

The Red Group List consists of the 30 best Men and the 30 best Ladies in the current Distance and Sprint World Ranking Lists (WRL). After each WRL period a new WRL will be compiled and the latest list is valid for the next WRL period. Racers having resigned before the start of the season will be substituted by the following.

If a competitor on the World Ranking Lists is unable to start for one (1) year, a new penalty as follows will be calculated according to the rank after his last penalty: The application for status as injured has to be confirmed by the FIS Cross-Country Committee (Executive Board).

Scale for penalties according to ranks:

3.4 Starting Order

At OWG, WSC and WC, the Seeded Group is defined as the top 30 competitors in the current World Cup Standing (Distance or Sprint). The current Overall World Cup Leader is added as one additional if not already included. No Men or Ladies within the ranking of top 30 will be substituted if they are not entered. Maximum 4 competitors per nation plus the World Champion of the respective discipline are allowed to start in a WSC. Check and notice the starting order for the "Multistage Events" 2009-2010 (see enclosure).

3.4.1 Starting Order for Interval Start (Distance Races)

- The 30 best athletes according the current World Cup standing registered to compete will start in reverse order as the last group according to the current World Cup Standings. The current leader of the Distance World Cup has the second last start number and the current leader of the Overall World Cup has the last one. The same method will be used at the WSC and OWG.
- From first start number to the beginning of the last group (top 30 of the current Distance World Cup standing) the athletes are assigned starting numbers according to their FIS Distance points, that means the athlete with the highest FIS points starts with the first number and so on.

3.4.2 Starting Order for Mass Start

For mass start competitions (including pursuits) the Overall World Cup Leader is always assigned the first start position and the remaining competitors in the seeded group are assigned the next start positions in order of their current Distance World Cup standing. Following the seeded group all other competitors will be assigned start positions according to the priorities in art. 334.2.

3.4.3 Starting Order individual Sprint Qualification

For the individual Sprint qualification round the seeded group starts first and the starting order within the group is drawn. Following the seeded group all other competitors will be assigned start positions according to the priorities in art. 334.2.

4. Evaluation

4.1 Points

4.1.1 Ladies and Men for individual distances:

1st place = 100 points	16th place = 15 points

Bonus World Cup points in Mass Start races

The first three athletes will get the following World Cup points at the defined bonus positions as mentioned below:

1st place =	15 points
2nd place =	10 points
3rd place =	5 points

In order for these World Cup points to be awarded, the competitor must complete the competition.

In all Mass Start races the additional bonus positions are implemented like:

4.1.2 Heat Sprints

Sprints with 30 athletes in the final:

1 – 6	A – final
7 – 12	will be fixed according to the results of the semi finals. See principles in ICR 360.5.1
13 – 30	will be fixed according to the results of the quarter finals. See principles in ICR 360.5.1.

Selections for the next round in the finale heats

Quarter Finales

Nr. 1 and 2 are directly selected; in addition the two quickest according to the time in the quarter finales. The faster of those two additionally selected athletes will be placed in Semi Finale 1 and the slower of those athletes will be placed in Semi Finale 2.

Semi Finales

Nr. 1 and 2 are directly selected in addition the two quickest according to the time in the Semi Finales for Finale A.

4.1.3 Team Sprint

Qualification (Semi Final)

Each athlete runs three laps by changing after each lap. After the qualification, there is a break of approx. 30 - 45 minutes, before starting the finales.

Final

The athletes will run 3 laps by changing after each lap.

4.2 **In case of a tie**, each competitor receives the points for that placing.
Example: Three-way tie for 12th place. All three competitors get 22 points; the competitor gets 16 points for the 15th place.

4.3 The Winners

4.3.1 The winner of the Overall FIS Cross-Country World Cup is the athlete, male and female, who scores the highest number of World Cup Distance points and World Cup Sprint points and the finale ranking of the "Multistage" Events for the Overall World Cup.

4.3.2 The winner of the **FIS Distance World Cup** is the competitor, male and female, who scores the highest number of World Cup Distance points in the final scoring in all individual Distance competitions.

4.3.3 The winner of the **FIS Sprint World Cup** is the competitor, male and female, who scores the highest number of World Cup Sprint points in the final scoring in all individual Sprint competitions.

4.4 Tie-Breaker

If two or more competitors score the same number of points in the final evaluation, the winner is the competitor who has:

- a) the highest number of individual wins
- b) the best results (i.e. most 2nd places, most 3rd places, etc.)

If the competitors are still equal, two (or more) World Cups will be awarded.

5. Nations Cup Scoring

5.1 The FIS Nations Cup

The individual scores of each country's competitors will be added and to this sum each country's relay scores will be added for a final total for the Nations Cup. The relay competitions are scored as follows:

1st place = 200 points	16th place = 30 points
2nd place = 160 points	17th place = 28 points

Only one Men's relay team per nation and one Ladies' relay team per nation will count for each event and this team must be named prior to the draw.

For mixed relays (Men and Ladies) the same rules and point-giving system as above will be used.

For Team Sprints (relays consisting of two athletes) the same scoring will be used as for individual races (see pt. 4.1.1). Only two (2) Men's Sprint teams per nation and two (2) Ladies' Sprint teams per nation will count for each event and these teams must be named prior with I and II to the draw. The national quota is two additional teams for each gender.

5.2 The Winners

5.2.1 The FIS Nations Cup

The winner of the Nations Cup is that country with the highest number of points calculated by adding the Men's and Ladies' FIS World Cup points including Sprints.

5.2.2 Tie-Breaker

If two or more nations have the same number of points the winner is that country which has:

- a) the highest number of first places
- b) the best results (most 2nd places, most 3rd places, etc.).

6. Advertising / FIS World Cup Title Sponsor / Media service

6.1 Advertisement / Marketing

Advertising and marketing must conform to the FIS Advertising Rules and Guidelines.

The advertising and marketing rights for FIS World Cup events belong to the National Ski Association. They can be transferred to the Organising Committee, the resort or the ski-club. After approval, the „Tour de Ski“ marketing and advertising rules have the first priority.

6.2 FIS World Cup Title Sponsor

The FIS concludes a contract with the official FIS World Cup title or presenting sponsor company or with an agency.

The FIS World Cup Organiser contract, concluded between FIS and the National Ski Association/Organising Committee respectively club, contains all advertising matter to be strictly observed by the parties involved.

6.3 Media

6.3.1 Press- and Media Service

The press- and media service organized by the Organising Committee must conform to the FIS PR and media regulations, elaborated in cooperation between AIPS Nordic, the FIS PR and Media Committee and the FIS Marketing and Communications Management.

6.3.2 FIS World Cup Press Coordinator

The OC's Chief of Press will be supported by the FIS World Cup press coordinator, who is nominated by the FIS and assists with general services in regard to PR, information, press service, winners press conference etc. on behalf of the FIS.

The organiser must provide good working conditions for the FIS press coordinator. The OC must consider his proposals. Furthermore it has to

pay his expenses for accommodation, meals, travel and eventual fees for visa. Prior to his travel the press coordinator must contact the organizer regarding the travel arrangements.

- 6.3.3** Each FIS World Cup Organizer must, before the beginning of winter, inform his national News Agency in time and make sure that, immediately after the World Cup competition the result list or at least the World Cup point ranks will be distributed by this agency.

7. Prizes

7.1 Prize-Money

All the prize-money should be paid in Swiss Francs (CHF) and has to be paid electronically.

7.1.1 Individual events: CHF 40'000.— per event, divided between positions 1–10:

In case of a tie result, both prize-monies will be added, divided by two and each athlete gets 50 %.

Check and notice the rules of the „Multistage“ Events 2009-2010 (see enclosure).

7.1.2 Relay and Team Sprint events: CHF 30'000.— per event, divided between teams 1 – 6:

In case of a tie result, both price monies will be added and divided by 2. And each team gets 50 %.

If athletes do not show up at the flower ceremony and prize distribution they may lose their right to receive the prize money. OC's must give the details of the prize giving schedule to the FIS Office by 30th September 2009. The FIS Office takes into consideration departure flight schedules and "force majeure" may authorize the distribution in the absence of the competitor.

7.1.3 Overall Prize-Money

For the 2009-2010 season, prize-money for an individual World Cup event, the amount of CHF 2'500 per competition shall be paid by the organisers in a so-called "overall pool" and will be distributed at the World Cup Finals (similar to the Tour de Ski). The reason for this request is to encourage the focus on the overall World Cup and the participation in a greater number of events by leading athletes.

*If a competition has to be cancelled, the prize-money has to be adapted.

7.2 FIS World Cup Trophies (for Ladies and Men)

- a) The Overall World Cup winners receive the big FIS World Cup trophy.
- b) The Distance and the Sprint World Cup winners receive each a small FIS World Cup trophy.
- c) Own FIS Trophies for the „Tour de Ski“ 2009-2010 (see enclosure).

7.3 FIS World Cup Medals

The first three competitors receive a FIS World Cup medal.

7.4 FIS World Cup Medals

The 4th, 5th and 6th competitors receive a FIS World Cup medal.

7.5 FIS Nations Cup / Team Cup

The best nation receives the FIS Nations Cup / Team Cup.

7.6

The trophies and medals will be provided by the FIS.

7.7

The VIESSMANN FIS World Cup Trophy and all other awards will be given at the conclusion of the last FIS World Cup event.

7.8 Leader Bib of the World Cup Leaders

The leader of the Overall World Cup wears officially the yellow bib. The leaders of the Sprint and Distance World Cups wear the red bib of their respective discipline.

7.9 **Leader Bib of the Team Events**

The current leading teams of the FIS World Cup (male and female) wear the leader bib. Naturally only the first team will wear it.

7.10 **Flower Ceremony / Distribution of Prizes**

The Flower Ceremony / prize giving ceremony will be standardised respectively a real ritual is celebrated. If an appropriate stage (location, town etc.) is available, the award ceremony will be carried out separately, otherwise the following procedure will be carried out.

Procedure

- Introduction with the FIS Fanfare
- Flower Ceremony / Award Ceremony

- Ranking of the day 1-3 (relay and Team Sprint 1 – 3)
(3 – 2 – 1) => photos
- In case of a new leader in the overall World Cup standing: Handing over of the yellow bib (overall leader)
- Official persons OC (1-2) & maid of honours.

8. **Carrying Costs**

8.1 The organiser shall pay for **the travel and living costs** (accommodation, food etc.) for the competitors on the current Red Group Lists (pay lists), 30 best Men and Ladies according to the current World Ranking List, their coaches and officials as follows:

- 1) For a maximum of one coach per nation and sex, if there are three or more athletes per sex in the Red Group List
- 2) An athlete of the Red Group List will also be reimbursed if he/she only participates in a Team event (Relay = Red Group List Distance / Team Sprint = Red Group List Sprint)
- 3) For the Technical Delegate and his/her assistants
- 4) For the current leader or winner (Ladies and Men) of the Continental Cups (see 3.3).

The Red Group list will be updated after each FIS World Cup period. The payment of the pay list will be based on personal places and travel costs will be calculated according to the schedule in 8.3. Travel costs will be paid by the organiser to the teams on their arrival at the site.

All World Cup results and max. two results of the distance and one sprint competitions at OWG or WSC will count for the Red Group.

If a competition is cancelled or an athlete gets sick after the official day of arrival, the travel and accommodation expenses must also be paid to the corresponding teams having athletes in the Red Group List, if they are present on the site. The official arrival day is earliest the day after the final snow inspection.

Reimbursement of athletes (accommodation and travel expenses) in the case where Distance and Sprint events are organised in one week-end (see below) the Red Group List quota will be compensated once only (not

once for Distance and additionally for Sprint), that means, if an athlete belongs to both Red Group Lists, they get reimbursed only once.

In the season 2009-2010 this concerns the following events:

Kuusamo, Davos, Rogla, Rybinsk, Otepää, Canmore, Oslo.

8.2 Regions

The FIS members are divided into five travel regions:

- 1) Northern Europe
(DAN, EST, FIN, ISL, NOR, SWE)
- 2) East Europe
(BLR, BUL, GEO, KAZ, LAT, LTU, RUM, RUS, UKR, UZB)
- 3) Middle and South Europe
(AND, AUT, BEL, BIH, CRO, CZE, FRA, GER, GBR, GRE, HUN, IRE, ITA, JUG, LIE, LUX, MON, NED, POL, RSM, SVK, SLO, SPA, SUI, TUR)
- 4) Overseas I
(ALG, CAN, EGY, IRA, ISR, LIB, MAR, MEX, RSA, SEN, SUD, SWZ, USA, ZIM)
- 5) Overseas II
(ARG, AUS, BRA, CHI, CHN, FIJ, GUA, HON, JPN, KOR, PRK, MGL, NZE, PHI, PUR, URU, ISV)

8.3 Schedule

Local organisers have to pay CHF 300.— per participant for the travel to the World Cup event if this is localized within the region or the country of the participant.

Check and notice the rules of the "Multistage Events" 2009-2010 (see enclosure).

8.4 Transport

Teams arriving or leaving by plane have to be transported to and from the venue free of charge under the following conditions:

Only one transfer per team. The arriving and departing times have to be communicated to the organiser at least one week in advance. The airport has to be chosen in cooperation with the organising committee.

Check and notice the rules of the „Multistage Events“2009-2010 (see enclosure).

8.5 Wax Cabins

At all FIS Sprint and Distance competitions each team has the right for minimum of 10 m² (1 to 2 athletes) and 15 m² (3-5 athletes). For more than 5 athletes, each athlete has the right to get 2 m² for waxing and 1 m² for changing/athletes lounge. If a team arrives with the motor home (wax cabins on the truck), the connections and the parking space has to be available for the team, but the team has to inform the OC latest 30 days before the competitions with the request form for the motor home and the wax cabins size will be reduced by the truck size.

If Distance and Sprint competitions are carried out at the same resort, the same athlete does not get counted double. The containers available in each country are different standard sizes; therefore the size of Wax cabins is decided by the size of these containers. Furthermore it needs a bigger capacity when carrying out Distance and Sprint competitions at the same resort.

Prevent breathing of waxing fumes by the athletes (detail definition will follow after a consultation by the Medical Committee). If this is not possible, a separate warming shelter must be provided for the athletes. The cabins should be equipped with locking doors and teams are to be issued with keys. If the entrances cannot be locked, the organiser must provide security for the cabins. Parking space for teams must be provided within a reasonable distance of the cabins. A loudspeaker of the public address system should be placed near the cabins.

Safety Guidelines for Wax Cabins

- All wax room staff should wear approved protective masks with filters
- The masks should ideally have intercom systems to enable the staff to communicate without removing the masks
- Suction for ventilation should be set up close to the waxing iron and the rotating polishing machines – this will reduce the smoke and pollution in the room
- General good heating and efficient ventilation
- The wax rooms must be cleaned and fully ventilated daily
- The time of exposure to smoke and pollution must be reduced to the absolute minimum per day
- Access to the waxing rooms without protective masks must be limited

- Written notices regarding the dangers for unprotected persons should be posted.

The wax cabins have to be ready 5 nights before the competitions.

- *) The detailed list will be sent out before the World Cup season 2009-2010 starts. SRS companies only accept cabins. The windows and heating are the main request to provide by OC. Concentration of the industry cabins at one spot.

If a nation has not entered the number/s will be reduced from the total sum. The minimum is according 1 to 2 athletes is 10 m² and 3 – 4 athletes is 15 m².

If a nation needs more capacity, the nation has to order the additional Cabins 30 days before the competition. The price for an additional container (15 m²) is CHF 1'400.— (independent of duration).

The organisers have to provide a heated wardrobe to the athletes' resp. to provide the wardrobe in connection with the waxing cabins. Wireless network in wax cabin/or athletes area is request for a World Cup organiser.

8.6 Accommodation

Each organiser will be responsible for rooms at 3 Star hotels incl. full board and 1 drink [3 dl]) for the **Red Group List and their qualified coaches**, for at least two nights before the first competition until at least the morning after the last competition. There shall be a maximum of two persons per room with separate beds.

For the other FIS World Cup team members (outside of the Red Group lists), the organiser shall offer the same quality room (standard 3 star) and full board at a maximum price of CHF 125.— per person (full board and 1 drink [3 dl]).

The National Teams have to receive the same conditions for 5 days before the competition (3 Star, incl. full board and 1 drink [3 dl]). The prices for the accommodation may not be higher than the official local prices offered at the time of the World Cup event. If teams wish to use other hotels than the ones proposed by the OC, the effective costs must be paid, i.e. the OC must pay CHF 125.— to the NSA, who has members of the Red Group lists that are booked at another hotel.

SRS Industry

- Price for SRS representatives that are carrying out equipment service (servicemen) as for teams, if available (3 members get the same price as the teams).
- Invitation has to be sent to all SRS industry companies by the OC.
- The entry will be done directly by each SRS industry company.

The distance for travel between the hotel and the competition site must not exceed 25 km. Each team has the right (for each gender) to have one single room without any additional costs. All other single rooms will be charged.

Each OC is obliged to nominate a **responsible person for the accommodation** and has the duty to inform the NSA. The NSA's are obliged to provide to the OC the final size of the team 10 days before the World Cup competition (size tolerance +/- 10 %). If the NSA changes this figures with more than 10 %, the NSA's are obliged to pay the difference between the effective and announced persons. In any case if the team size will be bigger than previously announced the effective costs must be paid.

9. Rescue Service – Medical Support Requirements

The Organizer is responsible for setting up and operating during all competition times (training and competitions) an appropriate rescue service. The Medical Support Requirements for FIS Event Organizers are given in the ICR, 221.6 as well as chapter 1 of the FIS Medical Guide.

10. Other

10.1 No skier shall be forced to enter a FIS World Cup competition

10.2 A Technical Delegate and an Assistant TD from another nation is appointed for every FIS Cross-Country World Cup competition. An additional Assistant TD is to be appointed by the National Ski Association.

10.3 These regulations, the agreement signed by FIS and the organisers, the World Cup handbook and the rules of the ICR are binding for the organisers of FIS Cross-Country World Cup events.

11. Promotion Cross-Country

All World Cup organizers pay a marketing fee of € 3'000.-- to promote Cross-Country skiing.

- Media press conferences

1. Basic Rules

- Only entry for all FIS TOUR DE SKI Stages is possible. Abandonment in one race will lead to exclusion from the rest of the FIS TOUR DE SKI.

This also includes ICR 340.1.5 (overlapping). In other Tour competitions, an athlete will be excluded from the rest of the Tour de Ski if he loses:

- Interval start (> 5 km)
 - more than 18 % for Ladies and
 - more than 15 % for Men.
- Interval start (< 5 km)
 - more than 23 % for Ladies and
 - more than 20 % for Men
- Handicap Start counts like a Mass Start competition

In special conditions the jury can adapt the percentages.

- The overall results for the FIS TOUR DE SKI will be based on the overall time score in the eight FIS TOUR DE SKI Stages. Sprint competitions will count as well.
- Tour Team Cup: Each day counts the best two Ladies and Men for the Team Cup. All times will be added.
- There will be a bonus system for the top 30 in the Sprint races. The Sprint bonus seconds for the overall FIS TOUR DE SKI ranking are as listed below. Bonus seconds are subtracted from the competitor's actual race time before being added into the overall time score.

4. FIS TOUR DE SKI Starting Order

Stage 1 (Prologue)

The athletes registered to compete will start in reverse order to the current World Cup Overall Standings. The athletes without any World Cup Overall points are assigned starting numbers according to their FIS Distance points that means the athlete with the highest FIS points starts with the first number.

Stage 2 (Handicap)

The starting bibs will be according to the result of the first Stage.

Stage 3 (Sprint)

For the individual Sprint qualification round the top 30 after 2 Stages starts first and the starting order within the group is drawn. Following the top 30 after 2 Stages all other competitors will be assigned start positions according to the FIS TOUR DE SKI ranking after 2 Stages.

Stage 4 (Sprint)

For the individual Sprint qualification round the top 30 after 3 Stages starts first and the starting order within the group is drawn. Following the top 30 after 3 Stages all other competitors will be assigned start positions according to the FIS TOUR DE SKI ranking after 3 Stages.

Stage 5 (Handicap Start)

The starting bibs will be according to the current FIS TOUR DE SKI standings after 4 Stages. To prevent too large start time differences, the Jury can decide upon the use of the "wave start".

Stage 6 (Interval Start)

All athletes registered to compete will start in reverse order as according to the current FIS TOUR DE SKI standings after 5 Stages.

Stage 7 (Mass Start)

For Mass start competition the Overall FIS TOUR DE SKI Leader after 6 Stages is assigned the first start position and bib and the remaining competitors are assigned the next start positions in order of their current FIS TOUR DE SKI standing after 6 Stages.

Stage 8 (Handicap Start)

The starting bibs will be according to the current FIS TOUR DE SKI standings after 7 Stages. To prevent too large start time differences, the Jury can decide upon the use of the "wave start" .

5. Quotas FIS TOUR DE SKI

The following table displays the suggested quotas for athletes and team staff members. There will be a national quota of 5 for all three hosting countries (GER, CZE, ITA). The calculations are based on Distance quota (D Quota) plus 50 % of the Sprint quota (S Quota), rounded downward.

No additional current COC leaders and no attention to the number in the Red Group. Only the overall World Cup winner from 2008-2009 gets an additional spot.

7. Transport

For FIS TOUR DE SKI Stage-to-Stage transportation, the teams must have their own vehicles and are independent (the FIS TOUR DE SKI Board has negotiated a preferential price with a car rental agency for any additional cars that need to be rented). There will be no transport provided by the FIS TOUR DE SKI from venue to venue, except the pick up at the first airport (before the first Stage) and transport to the final airport (after the last Stage) the teams are entitled to one transport in each direction (airport to the venue and venue to the airport) for free.

8. Reimbursement

The organisers pay for **the living costs** (accommodation, food etc.) for the competitors on the current Red Group Lists (pay lists), 30 best Men and Ladies according to the current World Ranking Lists (Sprint and Distance), their coaches and officials as follows:

For a maximum of one coach per nation and gender, if there are three or more athletes per gender in the Red Group Lists (Sprint and Distance lists).

Travel costs will be paid once by the organisers to the teams at the last resort.

The **Red Group List and their qualified coaches get free accommodation**, for at least two nights before the first FIS TOUR DE SKI competition until at least the morning after the last FIS TOUR DE SKI competition.

9. Registration/Entries

To register the participating teams, the FIS Tour de Ski Online Registration System must be used. Only entry for all FIS TOUR DE SKI Stages is possible and abandonment in one race will lead to exclusion from the rest of the FIS TOUR DE SKI.

The registration deadlines are included in the invitation. Registration can only be submitted electronically.

10. Gas Money for Teams

The organisers pay for the gas costs to the teams as follows:

11. FIS TOUR DE SKI Trophy

12. Leader Bib

The current leader of the FIS TOUR DE SKI wears the FIS TOUR DE SKI overall leader bib. The current leader of the Tour Sprint ranking wears the Sprint leader bib. If the same athlete is leading the Overall and the Sprint ranking, the athlete will wear the Overall leader bib and the second in the Sprint leader ranking will wear the Sprint leader bib.

13. FIS TOUR DE SKI Prize-Money

The overall Prize-Money will be paid after the last Stage. Daily Prize-Money will be paid out on-site after the event.

14. Ceremony

The flower ceremony and prize giving ceremonies are standardized.

- Ceremony
- Stage Ranking: Winner
- Handing over the FIS TOUR DE SKI Leader Bib
- Handing over the FIS TOUR DE SKI Sprint Leader Bib

15. Postponement/Substitution

There will be no postponement or substitution of FIS TOUR DE SKI competition in the case of a cancellation of an individual Stage except if there is no Stage scheduled for the following day. In this case, the Tour Board and Jury can decide to postpone a Stage by 24 hours.

The top 50 according to the current Overall World Cup Standings 2009-2010 before the World Cup Final have the right to start, no replacement will be made.

To the final quota belong as well the:

- COC leaders or winners 2009-2010,
- U23 WSC winners and
- 5 national spots for the host country.

7. Reimbursement

The organisers pay for **the living costs** (accommodation, food etc.) for the competitors on the current Red Group Lists (pay lists), 30 best Men and Ladies according to the current World Ranking Lists (Sprint and Distance), their coaches and officials as follows:

- For a maximum of one coach per nation and gender, if there are three or more athletes per gender in the Red Group Lists (Sprint and Distance lists).

Travel costs will be paid once by the organisers to the teams on the last stage. The **Red Group List and their qualified coaches get free accommodation**, for at least two nights before the first FIS WORLD CUP FINAL competition until at least the morning after the last FIS WORLD CUP FINAL competition.

8. FIS WORLD CUP FINAL Prize-Money

The prize-money will be paid after the last Stage.

9. Ceremony

The flower ceremony and prize giving ceremonies are standardized.

Introduction with the FIS WORLD CUP FINAL fanfare:

- Ceremony
- Ranking of the day 3-1
- Handing over the FIS WORLD CUP FINAL Leader Bib
- Official persons OC (1-2) & maid of honors.

10. Postponement/Substitution

There will be no postponement or substitution of FIS WORLD CUP FINAL competition in the case of a cancellation of an individual Stage except if there is no Stage scheduled for the following day. In this case, the FIS WORLD CUP FINAL Board and Jury can decide to postpone a Stage by 24 hours.
